

## Karl Kinney Outstanding Graduate Student Scholarship in Entomology

**Eligibility:** Any student who has completed at least one semester of graduate study at Colorado State University and is currently enrolled in an entomology graduate degree program (M.S. or Ph.D.) in the Department of Bioagricultural Sciences and Pest Management.

**Criteria:** The candidate should possess a dedication to the field of entomology. The candidate should also have demonstrated excellent academic achievement; exhibited a high potential for research, extension, or teaching accomplishments; participated actively in departmental and/or university activities; and demonstrated an ability and willingness to help and work cooperatively with others. This scholarship is \$500.

Mr. Kinney was born Nov. 1, 1952, in South Bend, IN and was raised in Plymouth, IN

Karl was 42 when he died in of Fort Collins on Oct. 14, 1995. He received his bachelor's degree in 1982 and his master's degree in 1985, from the Department of Entomology at Purdue University. He was assistant research biologist at the Illinois Natural History Survey from 1985 to 1990, and a research assistant at the University of Wisconsin, Department of Entomology from 1990 to 1995.

Mr. Kinney moved to Fort Collins in 1995, when he became an extension specialist and research associate for the Department of Entomology at Colorado State University. Mr. Kinney was the author of numerous scientific publications, as well as being the recipient of several professional awards. He also served as a representative on many professional committees, and while at the University of Wisconsin, he was instrumental in the formation of the Entomology Graduate Student Association Development Fund.

In addition to being an active long-standing member of the Entomological Society of America, he was a member of the International Society of Chemical Ecology, the Ecological Society of America, the Central States Entomological Society, the Georgia Entomological Society and the Michigan Entomological Society. His former wife, Lynne; and his daughter, Adrienne live in Kentucky where Lynne is a professor in the Entomology Department at the University of Kentucky.
